



The arts and culture sector in Halton Hills is comprised of artists, creators and cultural businesses, groups and organizations. This vibrant sector plays an important role in building safe and welcoming communities, enhancing public space, and contributing to a thriving economy by attracting investment, cultural tourism, and contributing to a high quality of life. The Town's commitment to cultural vibrancy is demonstrated through the continuous delivery of programs and initiatives that support a thriving cultural sector that continues to recover from the pandemic.

This State of Culture report covers the period from 2022-2023. It articulates the value of culture, the strong community support for cultural programs and opportunities, and provides an overview of the Cultural Services division and its programs to strengthen the creative sector by providing professional development, funding supports and new opportunities for programming and public engagement. Community partnerships and collaborations are vital to the successful delivery of Cultural Services.

At the beginning of 2022, the sector was still strongly impacted by COVID-19. Restrictions were lifted in phases throughout the winter and spring. In 2023, the sector returned to a full year of programming and events without restrictions for the first time since 2019. Lessons learned from the pandemic have been incorporated into ongoing practices with virtual program offerings continuing to provide increased accessibility. The data in this report will serve as a new baseline from which to monitor the future progress and ongoing impacts of arts and culture in Halton Hills.








Direct Economic Impact of Culture & Sports in Halton Hills - 2021 (*1)


CULTURAL SERVICES OVERVIEW

The Cultural Services division implements programs that position Halton Hills as a diverse, welcoming, connected and vibrant community with a high quality of life. It makes the community more livable, contributing to economic development by making Halton Hills a preferred location to live, work, create and invest. The division supports a thriving arts and culture sector, presents varied cultural programming, and leads the Town's Equity, Diversity and Inclusion and Truth and Reconciliation portfolios.



MEET THE TEAM



The Cultural Services workplan is implemented by a small team of cultural professionals.

Management

Manager of Culture and Equity, Diversity and Inclusion (Full Time) Manages all aspects of the Cultural Services division including the portfolios of Culture; Equity, Diversity and Inclusion; and Truth and Reconciliation. Responsible for setting strategic direction, budgets, ensuring operational oversight, and advising the Commissioner on culture, equity and reconciliation matters.

Programming & Policy

Cultural Services
Coordinator (Full Time)

Supports all aspects of the delivery of the Cultural Services workplan, including communications, marketing, research, and information management.

Cultural Program Producer (Full Time)

Responsible for developing and delivering Cultural Services programming, and Professional Development and Community Funding Programs for the arts and culture sector.

Public Art Coordinator (Contract)

Coordinates all aspects of the Town's Public Art Program, in accordance with the Public Art Master Plan including temporary and permanent works, supporting private sector and community-led initiatives and developing programming and policy.

Cultural Services Assistant (Annual Short-Term Contract)

Assists in the delivery and development of cultural programs and events, including Culture Days.

Helson Gallery

Art Gallery Curator (Part Time)

Manages the Helson Gallery including its exhibitions, public programs, volunteer docent program and the art collections of the Town and Library.





THE ARTIST NEXT DOOR



The Artist Next Door program funds new community-engaged artwork by local artists in any artistic discipline with up to \$1,000 per project. Launched in 2020, the program has funded 21 community-engaged projects.

This program highlights the capacity for the arts to build and strengthen community relationships, improve health and wellbeing, allow for creative placemaking and enjoyment, as well as create opportunities for public engagement and learning.

Culture Days is an annual Canada-wide celebration of arts and culture. Culture Days aims to increase public awareness of and participation in arts and culture activities. It raises the profile of the cultural sector, increases year-round participation in the arts and attracts tourists who spend in the local community.

Each year, Halton Hills Culture Days showcases a community of talented local artists and creators. Since 2018, this annual celebration of arts and culture has been organized by Town staff who have supported artists, cultural groups and creative businesses to host 468 Culture Days events for nearly 20,000 residents and visitors.





CULTURE DAYS PROGRAMMING HIGHLIGHTS

A Place I Call Home Halton

This community-driven artwork was created and led by contemporary artist Faisal Anwar in collaboration with the Town of Oakville, Town of Milton, Museums of Burlington, and Halton Region Heritage Services. It explored the concept of "HOME" and invited participants to share their interpretations of home through images on social media. The photos culminated in an interactive large-scale installation projected in prominent locations within Halton Region, including the John Elliott Theatre.



Ontario Culture Days Spotlight Winner: Best Collaborative Program





Participants joined Luckystickz in the John Elliott Theatre for this fun, interactive introduction to steel pan drums. This 1 hour session included a performance, talk on the history and development of the instrument, and 30 minutes of hands on workshop time where participants learned and performed a song on the drums.

Artist and colouring book creator Arielle Rahal transformed two plywood panels into canvases for the public to colour, featuring the historic McGibbon Hotel and the Limehouse Conversation area. These colourful panels weave heritage and community into a downtown construction site.

HELSON GALLERY

The Helson Gallery is an important cultural space in Halton Hills. It features exhibitions of local art, private collections and travelling exhibitions. Curated shows are also exhibited in the Sisnett Lobby of the Cultural Centre, the Georgetown and Acton Library branches and Town Hall.

Gallery staff care for and maintain the Town and Library art collections, as well as the Helson Collection which was certified as Cultural Property by the Canadian Department of Heritage, recognizing its outstanding significance.

HELSON GALLERY PROGRAMS & EVENTS



School Programs

Grade differentiated programs from kindergarten to grade 8 reinforce the requirements of the Ontario Curriculum in Visual Arts and offer opportunities for many more curriculum connections. In each 90-minute program students explore a variety of artworks as well as create their own art.



Family Drop-in Sessions

Provide an opportunity for families to create a piece of art inspired by the work currently on display in the gallery. This program encourages visitors to explore the current exhibition and engage in a discussion of art and art making. Appropriate for all ages.



Inspirations Art Program

This program is designed for those with special needs. Its purpose is to inspire creativity and promote social and therapeutic wellness while using art as a means of communication and confidence building. Participants tour the gallery before taking part in a watercolour lesson.



Life Drawing in the Gallery

Connect and hone figure drawing skills with these free, self-directed sessions in the Helson Gallery. Artists bring their own supplies. Increased accessibility through online streaming offered during Culture Days.



Plein Air Events

The Helson Gallery co-presents two plein air events annually in partnership with various local art organizations in June and September. Artists are invited to paint outdoors, capturing scenery and natural light. Works are juried and prizes are awarded.


HELSON GALLERY: EXHIBITION HIGHLIGHTS

Le petit salon: Canadian Artists and Impressionism April 27 - July 23, 2022

This exhibition featured over 60 works by noted Canadian artists. The exhibition traced the influences of French Impressionism during the late 19th and early 20th centuries. Paintings and prints were generously lent from several private collections and appropriate works from the Town's historically significant Helson Collection were also included.

Supporting Humanitarian Relief in Ukraine April 2022

Donated artworks were exhibited for sale with proceeds supporting humanitarian aid in the Ukraine. The upper lobby featured paintings by Albert Gnosill, a contemporary of the Group of Seven. Proceeds were donated to the Pomich Ukraini Fund, which provides aid to Ukrainian war orphans. The work of several local artists was on view in the Lower Sisnett Lobby exhibition Hope/Nadiya. The show included a variety of styles and media. Artists donated proceeds to charities in support of Ukrainian relief.

Emancipation Exhibition
June 21 - August 27, 2023

In partnership with the Halton Black History Awareness Society (HBHAS), the Helson Gallery exhibited the sixth annual Emancipation Art Exhibition. The exhibition explored and celebrated freedom through the perspectives of Black artists. The exhibition featured over 20 artists exhibiting in a variety of mediums on view in the Helson Gallery and the Sisnett Lobby. Artworks that best reflected and articulated the Black Experience were selected for awards through a juried process. A learning opportunity was created for an Internship through Western University. The student learned both from HBHAS on its goals and community work, and from the Helson Gallery on the process for curating and exhibiting a juried art exhibition.



PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

Bell Box Mentorship Program

This 2022 program was led by multidisciplinary artist, Yasaman Mehrsa. Five participants learned how to take their artwork off the canvas and into the public art landscape over the three-week program. Participants who completed this program had the opportunity to submit proposals to paint a utility box for the Halton Hills Bell Box Mural Project.

Artrepreneur

Artists, creative entrepreneurs, and cultural not-for-profit representatives participated in this professional development program. Participants learned vital skills suitable for arts and culture businesses. This program was delivered by Cultural Services from 2020-2022 and was licensed from York Region Arts Council.

A total of 26 graduates participated in three Artrepreneur cohorts. Of these, 22 graduates have participated in additional Cultural Services programs & opportunities.

PUBLIC ART PROGRAM







Public art contributes to the creation of a safe, welcoming, vibrant, and connected community with a thriving economy. Unique works of art enhance public spaces, support placemaking, attract cultural tourism, and raise the quality of life, which is a major driver of investment attraction.



ART AROUND ACTON



In 2022, the Town partnered with the Downtown Acton BIA to deliver Art Around Acton which provided residents and visitors alike with seven temporary and permanent public art activations in downtown Acton. Art Around Acton engaged local, regional, and provincial artists and businesses to enhance public space and draw people into the downtown core.

This project was supported by a \$100,000 grant from Hamilton Halton Brant Regional Tourism Association through the Government of Canada's Tourism Relief Fund, delivered by the Federal Economic Development Agency for Southern Ontario.

Art Around Acton directly engaged 23 artists and 14 businesses.



Colour Unleashed, a banner series by Shelley Newman

Local artist Shelley Newman fills her canvases with an abstracted impressionist interpretation of the Canadian landscape. Shelley aimed to bring a smile to the community with this uplifting and joyful public art banner project displayed in downtown Acton. Five banner designs and a total of 29 banners were installed. Shelley's originals and prints are enjoyed across Canada, the United States and around the world.



Picnic Tables

Local and GTA artists painted five picnic tables. The tables provided an accessible art experience to residents and visitors and made a vibrant addition to local restaurants in the Acton BIA core and Prospect Park. Photo features picnic table with artwork by Omar (Oms) Hopkinson.

Wrapped Utility Box, Jaguar by Andrea Rodriguez

Andrea Rodriguez aims to create awareness about the loss of the tropical rainforest through engaging and eye-catching messages that motivate people. Andrea works in a multidisciplinary setting, combining her design knowledge with her love for mural and lettering art. Located at the intersection of Main & Mill Streets in Acton.



Music Series

A six-week music series at the Acton Farmer's Market featured musicians: Monty Greig, August Eleven (pictured left), Paula Sofia, Madison Galloway, Tragedy Ann, & John Muirhead.



Artist Residency

Visual artist, curator, educator and community arts practitioner Ingrid Mayrhofer held an 8-week artist residency at the Acton Farmer's Market. Mayrhofer worked with a "Tree of Life" motif and invited the public to contribute sketches and clay pieces. Participants also had the option to take a self-curing clay piece home. The residency concluded with an artist talk and the presentation of a final artwork with Judi Henhawk Sault at the Acton Library Branch.



Acton Solstice Festival

The Department of Illumination presented the Acton Solstice Festival, which saw over 500 people come out to Prospect Park on one of the coldest nights of the year. The festival transformed the park with lighted art installations, a festive community procession featuring giant puppets, Juno award-winning musician Richard Underhill and the Kensington Horns, illuminated circus artists from Trellis Arts, and more.

BELL BOX MURAL PROJECT

Launched in 2022, this ongoing initiative in partnership with Bell Canada sees new murals added to the community annually through a juried selection process.

In its first two years, this project resulted in eight painted boxes throughout Halton Hills.

UNDER WRAPS

Under Wraps re-imagines utility boxes as canvases to enliven the streetscape in Halton Hills. The artworks include a range of disciplines, styles and subject matter such as abstract, impressionism, landscape, and realism paintings, photography, and digital artworks that are printed on vinyl wraps and installed on Town owned utility boxes.

Under Wraps raises the profile of artists, the local arts sector, and the Public Art Program. In 2022 and 2023, seven new artworks were added to this program which now includes 16 vinyl wrapped boxes throughout Halton Hills.



Orange Crosswalk

An Orange crosswalk was installed on September 30, 2022 at Main Street and Confederation Street in Glen Williams. The crosswalk is part of the Town's ongoing efforts to move forward on the path to Truth and Reconciliation. It is a symbol to honour the Indigenous children who did not return home from residential schools and to show support for the survivors who did. An inauguration event for the crosswalk was held in October. Special guests Gimaa (Chief) Laforme, Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation, Eddy Robsinson, Halton's Indigenous Advisor, and former Mayor Rick Bonnette spoke at the event. Guests included Councillors, Town staff, students and staff from Glen Williams Public School, and residents. The public was encouraged to paint Moccasins on the bridge as part of the Moccasin Identifier Project and then all in attendance walked across the crosswalk together to inaugurate it and demonstrate their commitment to Truth and Reconciliation.

CONCLUSION

The arts and culture sector plays an important role in supporting a thriving economy through investment attraction and retention, cultural tourism, and raising the quality of life. The arts and culture sector provides 525 jobs in Halton Hills and contributes \$45 Million directly to the municipal GDP. The creative sector also supports community identity, a sense of belonging, and health and wellbeing that is recognized and valued by residents, visitors, and businesses in Halton Hills.

In 2023, Halton Hills' Culture Days ranked 3rd nationwide out of communities big and small. The number of activities offered by the local arts and culture sector demonstrates their desire to engage the community and a 100% satisfaction rate among local program participants speaks to the quality of programming and the interest of the public in arts and cultural opportunities. A robust public art program including annual programs Under Wraps and the Bell Box Mural Project contributes to positive street activity and has been well received by residents and businesses. The Helson Gallery is a key cultural hub, exhibiting local, provincial, national and international artists. It provides learning opportunities to schools and the community and supports activities and events like Plein Air Painting and Music in the Gallery. Diverse cultural programs year-round, including OnScreen at the JET, provide the community with opportunities to engage with a wide range of voices and experiences. Professional development and funding opportunities like The Artist Next Door, support the artists, creators, cultural businesses and organizations that make up Halton Hills' creative economy.

Create Halton Hills contributes to building a diverse, safe, welcoming, connected and vibrant community, providing valuable programs and services to the cultural sector and public and advancing Council's Strategic Plan. Cultural Services staff works with more than 420 artists, organizations, businesses and community partners to strengthen and raise the profile of the sector, contribute to a high quality of life, and make Halton Hills a preferred location to live, work, play, create and invest.
